She sent a note to me the next day to say how much she enjoyed seeing us. She was always so appreciative of all we did.

Bert and I were the same age and I were always kidding her that she was the older sister that I never had.... we were just six weeks apart!! Bert was my rock when things went wrong, and they did go wrong a lot... especially with me and computers or phones or driving in lots of traffic around a city I didn't know! She would sit by me and calmly talk me through it all with a cool, calm, steady voice and things always worked out. The English and Americans speak the same language but often my British meanings were very different than American and Bert would "get" me!! She understood me better than anyone and would talk me down when I was frustrated about something or someone in life! We had many great conversations. I'll miss them.

I sponsored Bert when she joined the Bellevue Dog Obedience Club. Soon after she joined, we had elections and it was hard to get people to run for the board. I asked Bert if she would run for Vice President. I told her it was an easy office as there was nothing to do except take over if the President couldn't finish her year. Well, that did happen sad to say and Bert did take over and did a great job for the club. However, she didn't forgive me for getting her in so deep with this and often reminded me... good naturedly. She introduced the Veterans class Run during the agility trial and we spent many hours making the bars that were given out to the veteran dogs, who thoroughly enjoyed their time to run

again! Bert had many wonderful ideas that made the club really fun and contributed so much to help make it what it is today! Summer Solstice 2023

The Longest Day (Summer Solstice) is observed on either June 20, 21, or 22, but this year, it falls on June 21. The timing shifts because it depends on when the Sun reaches its northernmost point from the celestial equator.

As the sun creeps up over the hills and into your town on June 21, you'll know it's here. That blessed time of year when barbecues and beach trips reign, when work slows and summer holidays mean getting together with friends and family. Just thinking about it likely brings up the smell of fresh cut grass and the taste of cold lemonade. Summer Solstice — also known as the first day of summer — has arrived.

It signals the start of astronomical summer. Because the Sun travels across the sky in its most elongated path during the summer solstice, that day has the most daylight hours.

Now then — people have celebrated this day for thousands of years. Some of the earliest party animals were the ancient Mesopotamians, Celtic Druids, Chinese, and Egyptians, and all of these cultures had their own ways of celebrating that make even our craziest backyard barbecues look tame. When was the last time you had a multi-story bonfire and danced around it naked? That's what we thought. But cultures have had good reason to celebrate since ancient times right up until today. It's the longest day of the year.

What foods are best cooked on a grill?

Some fruits and vegetables, like zucchini squash, onions, and eggplant, do especially well on the grill. Eggplant, zucchini, squash, and onions grill particularly well. When cooking vegetables, just make sure you infuse them with flavor before putting them on the grill.
